

DEADLY CYCLONE HITS SOUTHERN AFRICA

Cyclone Idai has devastated parts of Southern Africa. Winds of up to 106 mph tore down homes and other buildings, and severe flooding has left thousands displaced and homeless.

Across Zimbabwe, Mozambique and Malawi where the cyclone made landfall, reports indicate that over 2.6 million people have been affected. More than 300 people have died, with many thousands more injured and homeless. In all three countries the work of Tearfund's partners has been impacted.

Florence from Muvandi village in Zimbabwe saw most of her home destroyed by the cyclone, along with the crops she relies on to sell and earn a living. 'I was due to harvest in a few weeks,' she says. 'My major challenge is that I am the bread winner, I look after my husband who [had a] stroke, as well as my grandson and two children.'

'Pray for our community. I have lived [here] for over 30 years now and never seen a flood. We were completely unprepared, so this has shaken us.'

Tearfund is working with local partners to assess the needs of people affected and provide help where it's needed most.

Edgar Jone, Tearfund's Country Director in Mozambique, told us: 'This is a huge setback for the work we are doing to support people to overcome poverty in Mozambique. Our priority now is reaching those people who have lost so much and support them to get back on their feet. Cyclone Idai has destroyed so much in an instant, but it will take years for people to rebuild what they have lost.'

BOTTLING A BETTER FUTURE

An eye-watering 500 billion single-use plastic water bottles are used worldwide every year. This World Water Day, Tearfund's overseas volunteers are looking at how they can make their water consumption more sustainable.

Clouds float in the river's reflection on a sunny afternoon near Northampton. Two girls stoop down to the murky water, fill up their water bottles and take a sip. Your typical Tearfund Go training weekend wouldn't usually involve drinking local river water. However, Ellie and Maria aren't using any old bottles to collect their water.

Travelling with Tearfund Go in July, they are some of the first volunteers to leave for their overseas placements kitted out with a reusable, recyclable water bottle. When used correctly, the bottle's ingenious inbuilt filter removes bacteria from contaminated water that can lead to diseases like cholera and typhoid.

In many of the countries where Tearfund works, the threat of contaminated water can make bottled water the only viable option for our volunteers.

'Plastic pollution is something that many of us are already concerned about, so we are really happy to have these reusable water bottles to take overseas with us on placement,' explains Ellie, who is travelling to Tanzania in July.

'Some of us are travelling to countries with no waste management services – not only are we reducing single-use plastic, but we are also reducing the burden on the communities we will be hosted by.'

Tearfund Go sends around 150 volunteers on placements every year, and destinations can be hot. On average, one volunteer will use over 1,000 single-use plastic water bottles on a three-month placement. By replacing this with one filter bottle, volunteers will have reliable access to safe water, while reducing their impact on local communities and respecting the planet.

'Reducing the use of single-use plastic is something we are really passionate about,' explains Hazel Swan, Tearfund Go Manager. 'So we are really excited to be able to provide our volunteers with these bottles.

'This is one of the easiest ways that our volunteers can reduce their use of plastic on placement,' Hazel said. 'This World Water Day we're thinking about how, in small and simple ways, we can value God's creation and demonstrate that we want to live in a less wasteful world.'

INSIDE OUT TRANSFORMATION IN CAMBODIA

Our partner World Relief works with some of Cambodia's most vulnerable communities. Not only does their relational approach release the potential of churches to help communities overcome poverty, it touches the lives of individuals too...

Kannitha, a 24-year-old mother of one, grew up craving a faith that felt real, but struggled to connect with the God she had been taught about.

One day, Kannitha was invited to participate in some skills training with World Relief. As she got to know the staff there, she started to experience the gospel of Jesus. 'I got to hear and learn about God's love for the very first time in my life,' says Kannitha.

Kannitha began to explore the Christian faith, discovering more about Jesus and inviting him into her life. She now volunteers with World Relief, and loves talking about her new-found faith. She finds particular joy in seeing people, 'not just believing, but (being) fully transformed economically, socially and spiritually.'

It's not just her faith that Kannitha is excited about, as people in her village are benefiting materially as well as spiritually. Local pastor, Savuth Oum, has been supported to introduce savings groups. This powerful approach is bringing people together to combine resources, face and overcome challenges together, and start to work their way out of poverty. And as lives are changing, relationships are building. 'I have learned that we came together as one unity in sharing failure, success, sadness and love with one another,' says Savuth Oum, happily.
